<u>"Journalist against violence against women</u>" a group of more than 70 journalists and editors from Serbia who fight violence against women in an organized, public, and emphatic manner. The group advocates that in media reports of violence against women, this issue must be presented, treated, and examined as a social problem – to point out its causes, clearly condemn any form of violence, and call to account the perpetrators of violence and the institutions responsible for protection against violence.
